# REACH OUT WITH THE GIFT OF PEACE AND FORGIVENESS OF THE RISEN LORD



On the second of Easter, the gospel passage provides us with the instance where the first disciples—dispirited and terrified

after the death of Jesus—are in a huddle, having locked themselves away in a room. They have to confront their failure to be faithful to Jesus in the hour of his passion and death. Suddenly Jesus stands among them, says to them, 'Peace be with you' and breathes the Holy Spirit upon them. The risen Lord was reconciling his failed disciples to himself; they came to recognize themselves as forgiven, and, so their hearts were filled with joy. Having experienced the gift of the Lord's forgiveness, they are sent out in the power of the Spirit to offer to others the gift of forgiveness they have received.

There is an interesting part in the gospel of today, namely, the absence of Thomas when the Lord appeared to the apostles. Thomas had not been in the room when the risen Lord appeared to the other disciples. He had missed out on the Lord's bestowal of the gifts of peace and forgiveness. Thomas seems to have cut himself off from the community of the disciples. He had gone off on his own to nurse his wounds, and so he missed out on the Lord's presence in the midst of the fearful and failed disciples.

Many people cut themselves off from the Church for a variety of reasons like the Apostle Thomas who kept away from the other disciples. As a result of Thomas keeping himself away from other apostles he missed something very precious—the gift of peace and forgiveness.

When we cut ourselves off from the community of believers, we lose out greatly. For all its flaws and failings, the church is the place where we encounter the risen Lord. The Lord continues to stand among the community of disciples, especially when we gather in worship and pray, when we gather to serve others in the Lord's name. It is there that we hear the Lord say, 'Peace be with you', that we experience his forgiveness for our past failures, that we hear the call to go out in his name as his witnesses, that we receive the Holy Spirit to empower us to be faithful to that mission.

The community of disciples reached out to Thomas; they shared their newfound faith with him, their Easter faith, 'We have seen the Lord'.

Well, those first disciples remind us of our calling to keep reaching out in faith to all those who, for whatever reason, have drifted away from the community of believers or no

longer have fire in them to follow the Lord's footstep. We may start with our children, dear and near ones and extend it to all those whom we encounter in our daily lives. When we do so, we may encounter the same negative response that the first disciples experienced from Thomas, 'I refuse to believe'.

Yet, even though our efforts seem to fail, as the efforts of the disciples failed, we know that the Lord will keep reaching out to them just as the Lord reached out to Thomas. 'Doubt no longer', he said to him, 'but believe'. Then, out of the mouth of the skeptic came one of the greatest acts of faith in all of the gospels, 'My Lord and my God'.

Our duty as the faithful followers of Jesus is to reach out to people around us with the message of His peace and forgiveness and the rest the Lord will do.

Thomas Merton wrote in his book *Asian Journal*, 'Faith is not the suppression of doubt. It is the overcoming of doubt, and you overcome doubt by going through it. The man of faith who has never experienced doubt is not a person of faith'. There was a great honesty about Thomas; he didn't pretend to believe when he didn't. The gospel suggests that such honesty is never very far from authentic faith.

May the Lord invigorate our faith in His living presence in our midst, and also give us the courage to reach out to others with His peace and Forgiveness.

### **Divine Mercy Sunday**

This Sunday is the second Sunday of Easter or Sunday of Divine Mercy. At the Mass for the Canonization of St. Faustina Kowalska, Pope John Paul II declared the Sunday after Easter be called "Divine Mercy Sunday." St. Faustina was a Polish nun who received visions from Jesus, including one of Jesus wearing a white garment with beams of red and white (representing the blood and water that flowed from his side at his crucifixion) coming from His heart, which came to be known as the image of Divine Mercy. According to the vision, those who receive communion & attend confession on the Feast of Mercy receive total forgiveness of sins. Divine Mercy Sunday focuses on the gift of mercy and love given through Christ's death, burial, and resurrection.

It is important to understand that this is not a new feast day in the Church. Divine Mercy Sunday gives an additional name to the day that is already a solemnity of the liturgical year. The previously established liturgical readings for the Second Sunday of Easter fit in perfectly with the theme of mercy. In the Gospel, the Lord imparts to the apostles His authority to bind and release the sins of men, thereby instituting the Sacrament of Penance. The feast of Divine Mercy, then, is a continuation of the celebration of Easter (as Pope John Paul once said, Christ's "Easter gift" to the world).

St. John Paul II not only declared Divine Mercy Sunday a universal feast of the Church, but attached a plenary indulgence to it. A plenary indulgence is a particularly powerful way to obtain remission of punishment -- on earth or in purgatory -- that would have resulted from sins that were already forgiven. It covers all sins, mortal or venial, that the recipient has committed up to that time, if the person sincerely repents, detests their sins and fulfills all requirements of the indulgence. There are the usual 3 conditions of: sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of Supreme Pontiff. And specific conditions required: "On Divine Mercy Sunday...

- in any church or chapel, in a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a sin, even a venial sin, take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy

- or, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. "Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!")"

### **Annunciation of the Lord**

(transferred from March 25 to April 8)



Celebration of the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord recalls the historical event of the Angel Gabriel appearing to the Virgin Mary, as found in Luke 1:26–38. It also celebrates the Church's faith in the underlying reality that took place at that moment in time. It celebrates the Incarnation, making this solemnity not

only a Marian solemnity, but first and foremost a Christological one. Though Christmas commemorates the birth of Christ, the Annunciation commemorates the Incarnation within the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

### **Saint Stanislaus, April 11**

Stanislaus was born near Kraków in 1030. He became bishop of Kraków in 1072. He spoke out against the unjust wars and immoral acts of King Boleslaus II in spite of charges of treason and threats of death, finally excommunicating the king. The king killed Stanislaus with his own hands.

### **Saint Martin I, April 13**

Born in Umbria somewhere around 590-600, he became the bishop of Rome in July of 649 to his death in 655. As Pope, Martin summoned the Lateran Council of 649, attended by 105 bishops & held five sessions. He published the decrees of the Lateran Council in an encyclical. He was arrested and banished to Greece where he died.

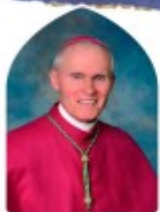

## Safe Environment Reporting Statement

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston maintains an Office of Safe Environment in accordance with the USCCB's Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People. To Report Suspected Cases of Sexual Abuse of Children: The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston encourages reporting to civil authorities first and foremost if a crime has been committed. We also encourage utilizing [www.reportbishopabuse.org](http://www.reportbishopabuse.org) to make a report about any bishop in the U.S. If you have reason to believe that a bishop has engaged in sexual misconduct, please contact civil authorities in the applicable jurisdiction & visit [www.reportbishopabuse.org](http://www.reportbishopabuse.org)

To Report to Civil Authorities: Contact your local law enforcement; numbers will vary based on your location. If you believe someone is in immediate danger, call 911. To confidentially report any incidence of suspected child abuse or neglect, including sexual abuse, contact the West Virginia Bureau for Children and Families' Child Protective Services by calling the Child Abuse Hotline at 800.352.6513.

To Report to Diocesan Authorities: In addition to civil authorities, the diocese encourages reporting to the appropriate church authorities. To report suspected cases of sexual abuse of children by personnel of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston to the Diocese, contact one of the following designees at 1.888.434.6237 or 304.233.0880: Mr. Bryan Minor, ext. 263; Mr. Tim Bishop, ext. 353; or Very Rev. Dennis Schuelkens, Jr., V.E., ext. 270. You may also call the Diocese's Office of Safe Environment at 304.230.1504.

In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious, or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via [www.dwc.org](http://www.dwc.org), under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
