THE GOOD SHEPHERD: OUR EXAMPLE FOR SHEPHERDING

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is Good Shepherd Sunday. This is also World Day of Prayer for Vocations. The most beautiful and meaningful comment on the life and legacy of Pope John Paul II was made by the famous televangelist, the late Billy Graham. In a TV Interview he said: "He lived like his Master, the Good Shepherd, and he died like his Master, the Good Shepherd." How did the Master live and how did the Master die? In the gospel of the fourth Sunday of the Easter Season, Jesus himself explains to us.

To the questions raised by the Jews whether he was the Christ or simply one of the many wandering preachers and leaders, Jesus—instead of giving a straightforward answer—tells them that he is the Good Shepherd.

The first striking quality of Jesus the Good shepherd is that he knows his sheep and his sheep hear his voice. One of the images of Jesus found in the catacombs of San Callistus in Rome is that of the Good Shepherd, where there is a young beardless man with a sheep draped around his shoulders and holding a bucket of water in his right hand. This image appealed to the Christians because it conveys the personal nature of the relationship between Jesus and his followers; it portrays the close personal care that the shepherd has for the sheep. The shepherd has gone looking for the one sheep that was wandered off and having found it, he carries it home to the flock upon his shoulders. There is a bond between the shepherd and this one sheep. Jesus declares that he knows his own and his own know him, just as the Father knows him and he knows the Father. It is an extraordinary statement to make. Jesus is saying that the very personal relationship he has with his heavenly Father is the model for the equally personal relationship he has with each one of us. Jesus knows us as intimately as the Father knows him, and he wants us to know him as intimately as he knows the Father.

There is a great deal to ponder there. When it comes to the Lord, we are not just one in a crowd, lost in a sea of faces. In a way that we will never fully understand, the Lord knows each one of us by name. He relates to us in a personal way, and he invites us to relate to him in a personal way. He wishes to enter into a personal relationship with each one of us. I am often struck by a line in Saint Paul's letter to the churches in Galatia, where he says, 'I live by faith in the Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me'. We can each make our own those words of Saint Paul. When Jesus says in today's gospel that, as the good shepherd, 'I lay down my life for my sheep', he is saying that he lays down his life for each one of us individually.

The second striking image of the Good shepherd is that He dies for his sheep: This element of Jesus' teaching that the Lord would submit to death is something very unique. He says, "I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down on my own". (John 17-18). Peter asserts unequivocally before the Jewish assembly that there is no salvation except through Christ the Good Shepherd, whom the Jewish leaders have rejected and crucified, and in whose name the apostles preach and heal. The savior-God loves us to the point of death. By doing so He sets an example for us: an example we often balk at following.

Jesus gives eternal life: Jesus is ready to submit to death: "I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down on my own" (John 17-8). A savior-God who loves us to the point of death. To my knowledge, no Buddha, Mohammad, or other religious leaders have ever offered to do it. Jesus our Shepherd readily lays down his life in love and sets an example for us, an example we are called to imitate.

All of us—Bishops, pastors, parents, teachers, doctors, nurses, bosses, government officials, and politicians etc.—are called to be shepherds in one way or the other. Following the example of the

Good shepherd calls for dedication, commitment, sacrifice, and vigilance every day.

The priest in charge of a parish is called pastor because "pastor" means shepherd. As shepherd, he is expected to lead the flock by example, feed, nurture, comfort, correct, and protect Christ's sheep, the people of the parish. On this Sunday, when I am installed as pastor, I feel how unworthy I am and yet I rely on the grace of the Lord. What gives me strength is the words of Paul's letter to Corinthians, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Cor. 12:9), which is also ordination motto. On 26 April, 2024, I will be completing my 27 years in the vineyard of the lord and it was the grace of the Lord that brought me thus far.

Today is Vocations Sunday. We each have a unique, equally significant vocation. Each one of us is vitally important to the Lord. When we respond to our unique vocation, we give a lift to everyone else. When one of us fails to respond to that vocation, we are all a little bit impoverished. We become good shepherds by responding to our vocations. It may be by loving those entrusted to us, praying for them, spending our time and talents for their welfare, and guarding them from physical and spiritual dangers. Parents must be especially careful of their duties as shepherds, becoming role models for their children by leading exemplary lives and living out what they are trying to teach their children.

Let's remember that Jesus taught us, "If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me" (Lk 9:23). The path of salvation is the path of the cross—a life of self-denial even to the point of death. This message may be terribly unpopular, because living out a shepherding role ultimately amounts to this. It takes great faith to believe that self-sacrifice is, in fact, the one and only way to experience resurrection and eternal life.

May the grace that we receive from communing with Christ in the Eucharist empower us to lay down our lives in love for those who are entrusted in our care.

Reflect with Your Family

Rev. Tony Campolo tells of a census taker visiting the home of a poor family in the mountains of WV to gather information. He asked the mother how many dependents she had. She began, "Well, there's Rosie, Billy, Lewella, Susie, Harry, & Jeffrey. There's Johnny, Harvey, and our dog, Willie." The census taker interrupted her: "No, ma'am. I only need the humans." "Ah," she said. "Well, there's Rosie, Billy, Lewella, Susie, Harry, and Jeffrey, Johnny, and Harvey." Once again, the census taker interrupted her. Slightly exasperated, he said, "No, ma'am, you don't seem to understand. I don't need their names, I just need the numbers." The old woman replied, "I don't know them by numbers. I only know them by name." Jesus, the Good Shepherd, says that he knows his sheep by name.

Smile with Your family

A man comes upon a shepherd guarding his flock & proposes a wager: "I will bet you \$100, against one of your sheep, that I can tell you the exact number in this flock." The shepherd accepts. "973," says the man. The shepherd, astonished at the accuracy, says "I'm a man of my word; take the sheep you have won." The man picks a sheep & begins to walk away. "Wait," cries the shepherd, "Let me have a chance to get even. Double or nothing that I can guess your exact occupation." "Sure," replies the man. "You work for the Tax Bureau," says the shepherd. "Amazing!" responds the man, "How did you deduce that?" "Well," says the shepherd, "if you will first put down my dog, I will tell you."

Saint George, April 23



Tradition holds that he was a Roman soldier, tortured & decapitated under Diocletian's persecution of Christians in 303. Richard I of England ("the Lionheart") invoked him as the protector of all soldiers. The story of St George serves to remind the world of a fundamental idea, that good ultimately triumphs over evil.

Saint Adalbert, April 23



He was trained in theology at Magdeburg, Germany. Elected as bishop in 982, Adalbert extended the influence of the church beyond the borders of the Czech kingdom. In 994 he left Bohemia to become a missionary along the Baltic coast, where he was martyred three years later.

Saint Fidelis of Sigmaringen, April 24



Born Mark Roy or Rey in 1577, Fidelis was a Capuchin friar who was involved in the Catholic Counter-Reformation, and was martyred in 1622 by his opponents at Seewis im Prättigau, now part of Switzerland. He was known for his modesty, meekness and chastity.

Saint Mark, April 25



Mark the Evangelist is the person who is traditionally ascribed to be the author of the Gospel of Mark. Mark was not one of the 12 apostles. Some scholars feel that Mark is speaking of himself when describing the arrest of Jesus in Gethsemane. Others hold Mark to be the first bishop of Alexandria, Egypt. Mark fulfilled in his life what every Christian is called to do: proclaim to all people the Good News that is the source of salvation.


ST FRANCIS YOUTH GROUP Fundraiser Dinner

POPE FRANCIS GRANTS PLENARY INDULGENCES FOR NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC PILGRIMAGE, CONGRESS PARTICIPANTS

Participants in the National Eucharistic Congress and related National Eucharistic Pilgrimage now have opportunities to receive plenary indulgences, Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, announced April 9. The plenary indulgence for National Eucharistic Pilgrimage is granted to anyone who participates in the pilgrimage between May 17 and July 16, as well as to elders, people with infirmities and "all those who cannot leave their homes for a serious reason and who participate in spirit with the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, uniting their prayers, pains, or inconveniences with Christ and the pilgrimage," the USCCB statement said. To receive the indulgence, an individual must fulfill the usual conditions: sacramental confession, Communion and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. In granting the indulgence, the Apostolic Penitentiary requests that all priests with appropriate faculties "present themselves willingly and generously in administering the Sacrament of Penance" to pilgrimage participants, according to the statement.

In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious, or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
