The Marks of True Discipleship



The reading of Fifth Sunday of Easter calls our attention to the question of knowing who the true disciple of Jesus is and who is

not.

The first reading is from the Acts of the Apostles which gives an account of the fear expressed by the Christians in Jerusalem when Paul arrived there and tried to join the disciples. They were skeptical of him because they do not know whether he is truly a disciple of Jesus, or an infiltrator waiting to betray them to the authorities. The background check of him indicated that he was spitting fire and persecuting the followers of Jesus. But Barnabas, who was a trusted disciple, convinced the Jerusalem church that Paul was sincere in his desire. He tells them that he had a direct experience of the Lord, and that he was willing to put himself at the risk by speaking "boldly in the name of the Lord. He was willing to speak the truth even at the risk of his life." Eventually, the Jerusalem Church accepts his discipleship in the Lord because he boldly spoke about Jesus' crucifixion. He was ready to face persecution and rejection for the sake of the Gospel.

Weak, insipid, and 'politically correct' speech intended not to communicate God's truth but win acclaim or acceptance from other people can never be the Gospel. However, it does not mean that we go out to offend everyone out there as some overenthusiastic followers do. The truth must be spoken with love because anything done without love is a sin. At the same time, true love can never lie nor cover up the truth.

Using the metaphor of a vine and a vinedresser, Jesus makes several striking points about the life of discipleship.

A true disciple bears fruit. "He [the Father] takes away every branch in me that does not bear fruit." The fruit that is intended is the spiritual fruits of growth in holiness, virtues, and good works. The gift of faith received gratuitously must grow and bear fruit. Jesus on one occasion said, "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one wo does the will of my Father in heaven." We must, therefore, guard against lukewarmness and spiritual sterility and strive to grow positively towards holiness.

A true discipleship calls for pruning. We are all familiar with pruning of fruit trees and flower plants. Their branches are cut off, and this process can be painful for the tree. However, when it goes through this process, the trees thrive, and fruits and flowers are produced in abundance. When Jesus uses this metaphor, he is saying that those who are disciples will have to undergo a kind of disciplinary process in pursuit of holiness. This process can be painful, but the result is great. It calls for cutting out of our lives everything that is contrary to the spirit of Jesus and renewing our commitment to Christian ideals in our lives every day. It also means practicing self-control over our evil inclinations, sinful addictions, and aberrations.

The disciple who remains in Jesus bears much fruit. There is a scene in the movie Shadow of the Hawk where a young couple is climbing a mountain with the help of their Indian guide in a desperate attempt to flee from evil people. At one point the young woman slumps to the ground and says, "I can't take another

step." The young man lifts her to her feet and says, "But darling, we must go on. We have no other choice!" She shakes her head and says, "I can't go on! I can't go on!" Then the Indian guide advises the young man, "Hold her close to your heart. Let your strength and your courage flow out of your body into hers. The young man does this and in a few minutes the woman smiles and śays, "Now I can go on! Now I can do it! Jesus tells, "whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing". He shares his Divine strength with us. We abide in Christ by drawing near to God and by experiencing His being near to us, that is, by living every moment as He has commanded us to do, with the radiant presence of Christ all around us. This life of intimate union with Christ in the Church is maintained by the spiritual helps common to all the faithful, chiefly by active participation in the Liturgy. Those of us who do not abide in Jesus will wither and be thrown away, just as withered branches are thrown into the fire to be burned. "Many scholars see the references to being 'apart from the Vine' as references to the beginnings of splinter groups within the Johannine community, and possibly to the beginnings of heretical groups which were leading people astray." (Dr. Watson). Fruit-bearing in Christian life is not of our own independent and unaided making. The Holy Spirit who dwells within us trims and prunes us, teaching us Himself and reminding us of what Jesus taught. It is He who enables us to love Him and to keep His words (John 14:24, 26).

In the encyclical, Gaudete et Exsultate, Pope Francis this has to say, "So, let me ask you: Are there moments when you place yourself quietly in the Lord's presence, when you calmly spend time with him, when you bask in his gaze? Do you let his fire inflame your heart? Unless you let him warm you more and more with his love and tenderness, you will not catch fire. How will you then be able to set the hearts of others on fire by your words and witness" (no.151).

Moreover, when we remain in Jesus and his words remain in us, we will desire what he desires, and our will be united to his, such that "whatever we want' will only be his will, and his will invariably be done.

As we wait for the rekindling of the Holy Spirit in our lives on Pentecost day, let us pray for the boldness of St. Paul in Christian life, strive to grow in holiness and make Jesus pivotal point in our lives. May the Lord help us in our effort.

Parish Life—Saints of the week..Faith Formation..Prayer Intention

Saint Catherine of Siena, April 29



Born in Siena, Italy, on March 25, 1347, she was the 24th of 25 children. By age 7, she gave her life to God. At 18 she became a Third Order Dominican. Catherine lived on little food. She offered her sufferings for the Church and the conversion of sinners, and was known to be radiantly

happy. She counselled many with great spiritual wisdom. Her soul was constantly at prayer. In 1380, Catherine travelled to Rome & there she died on April 29 at 33 years of age. The teaching of Catherine, who learned to read with difficulty and learned to write in adulthood, is contained in the Dialogue of Divine Providence or Libro della Divina Dottrina, in her Epistolario and in the collection of her Prayers.

Saint Pius V, April 30



Pius was born in 1504 in Bosco, Italy. A shepherd until the age of 14, he became a Dominican friar. His first job was an Inquisitor (discovering, examining, and punishing heretics). He was appointed Pope in 1566. His tenure was one of the most austere and reformatory. He ordered the founding of seminaries for the proper training of priests. He published a new missal, a new breviary, a

new catechism, and established the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine classes for the young. Pius zealously enforced legislation against abuses in the Church.


Saint Joseph the Worker, May 1



To capture the devotion to Saint Joseph within the Catholic liturgy, in 1870, Pope Pius IX declared Saint Joseph the patron of the universal Church. In 1955, Pope Pius XII added the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker.

This silent saint, who was given the noble task of caring and watching over the Virgin Mary and Jesus, now cares for and watches over the Church and models for all the dignity of human work. St. Joseph was a carpenter, meaning that he would have made various items such as plows and other farm equipment, doors, chests, and furniture. He taught this trade to Our Lord. The life of St Joseph shows us the dignity of human work, which is the duty and the perfection of human beings, who in this way exercise dominion over creation, share in the work of the Creator, offer their service to the community, and participate in God's plan of salvation.

Saint Athanasius, May 2



Born of a Christian family in Alexandria, Egypt, and given a classical education, Athanasius became secretary to Alexander, the bishop of Alexandria, entered the priesthood and was eventually named bishop himself. Five times Athanasius was banished and spent 17 years of his life in exile

his defense of the doctrine of Christ's divinity.

Saints Philip and James, May 3



Philip and James were both apostles, and both served Christ faithfully during the very early days of the Church. In the sixth century, Pope Pelagius I traveled to Constantinople and brought the relics of the Apostles Philip and James back to Rome, placing them in what is today called the Church of the Holy Apostles. It is for this reason that

we honor these two Apostles together with one feast. These very human apostles relay the questions and wonderings of many Christians of present times.

POPE FRANCIS GRANTS PLENARY INDULGENCES FOR NATIONAL **EUCHARISTIC PILGRIMAGE, CONGRESS PARTICIPANTS**

Participants in the National Eucharistic Congress and related National Eucharistic Pilgrimage now have opportunities to receive plenary indulgences, Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, announced April 9. The plenary indulgence for National Eucharistic Pilgrimage is granted to anyone who participates in the pilgrimage between May 17 and July 16, as well as to elders, people with infirmities and "all those who cannot leave their homes for a serious reason and who participate in spirit with the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, uniting their prayers, pains, or inconveniences with Christ and the pilgrimage," the USCCB statement said. To receive the indulgence, an individual must fulfill the usual conditions: sacramental confession, Communion and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. In granting the indulgence, the Apostolic Penitentiary requests that all priests with appropriate faculties "present themselves willingly and generously in administering the Sacrament of Penance" to pilgrimage participants, according to the statement.

In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious, or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
