# OVERWHELM OURSELVES WITH THE TOUCH OF THE LORD!



The readings of today, the first and the Gospel, revolve around leprosy and how it was dealt

with in the past. Yet they do teach us some important spiritual truths.

The book of Leviticus deals with some of the most ordinary matters, and it does so with some spiritual objectives: to live a life centred on God.

Leviticus 13:1-2, 45-46, given for our reflection on the 6th Sunday in Ordinary time discusses the identification and isolation of individuals with skin diseases, often referred to as leprosy. The verses outline the procedure for priests to examine and diagnose such conditions, emphasizing the necessity for those afflicted to dwell outside the vicinity of people until their healing or purification. Their life was a living hell. They were required to live in a perpetual state of mourning, public disgrace, exclusion. They could not approach the sanctuary to worship (the sanctuary was the most public place and was where their disease could be most easily transmitted). Therefore, they felt cut off from God and such situation was considered a punishment from God.

Although the Scriptures recognize that leprosy and other skin disease were not the result of moral offence on the part of the sufferer, at the same time, these kinds of diseases were viewed as a powerful symbol of the effects of sin. Sin is a clinging contagion that contaminates the sinner and those he contacts. It destroys human relationships and our communion with God. Sin is spiritual leprosy.

The gospel passage presents before us Jesus' interaction with a leper. The leper approaches Jesus and expresses faith in his ability to heal. The words of the leper, "if you choose, you can make me clean" acknowledges that healing rests within the will of God. When Jesus looked at this poor, wretched man and saw his condition, his heart was stirred to action. He disregards all the social and religious customs stretches out his hands and touches him.

Just imagine what this gesture itself would means to a man who has been isolated from his own family and society and even the community of worship for years. This gesture conveys a very important thing for us all. Jesus loves us just the way we are. He loves us with all our imperfections and weakness. His touch comes before the healing, his love for us comes before our conversion. It is interesting to not that the man does not ask to be healed, medically speaking, but rather to be made clean. So, what is the difference between being healed and being made 'clean'? To be made clean has a spiritual and social dimension. He believes that Jesus can make him whole again, return to his family, allow him to go back to his work, and back to worshipping God in the temple along with all others. This leper was not asking for mere healing. He wanted to be CLEAN! Through a simple touch, the man is healed of his leprosy and his place is established within the community, within his family and the religious life of God's people. Jesus raises the leper from the wretched situation and gives him dignity and he acknowledges it and freely makes Jesus known. And after his healing, Jesus did not just send him away. He sends him to the priest at the temple. This man was told to go and fulfil the requirement of the Law for his cleansing. This leper was to go and present himself to the priest and get a certificate of cleansing based on the ceremony in Leviticus 14.

We may not suffer from physical leprosy, but we surely can suffer from spiritual leprosy. Hurts, pains, baggage keeps us from experiencing the fullness of life. What keeps us separate from communion with God and others is not something outside of ourselves. Jesus is still willing to touch our lives today. He is waiting to heal and cleanse us only if we let him. The leper in the Gospel let the Lord touch him. Let us pray that we may grow to learn more about our spiritual leprosies and experience the cleansing touch of Jesus. Christ present in the Eucharist is able to do the cleansing.

We see the change in the leper after he was cleansed, though Jesus asks him to go and get his cure certified, the man becomes enthusiastic preacher of the favour of God. It is not that the man deliberately wants to disobey the command of Jesus, but he is so overwhelmed by his cure that he wants to be grateful to the healer. We have innumerable favours for which we have to be grateful to God and to testify. May the Lord help us in our effort.

(Birth – Age 7) Parents are required to participate in a preparation program before the celebration of Baptism. Parents must be registered and attending Sunday Mass.

#### **Marriage Preparation**

Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Francis of Assisi Church should be practicing Catholics. They are required to participate in a Marriage Preparation Program before the marriage. At least six months advance notice is required for the marriage. Please contact the office in person to set the date for marriage.

#### **Order of Christian Initiation**

Children 7-14 years of age, and Children 15 years of age and older & Adults who have not been baptized or have been baptized and not confirmed go through a faith formation program before they are admitted to the sacraments.

Work is underway to prepare the house at 524 Holley Street for service as the parish office. As mentioned after the properties were purchased, the target date to have the house functioning as the office was set as on or before April 1. All of the work done to date has been provided by volunteer labor. Completed work includes:

- The interior has been painted.
- Lighting in all of the rooms has been updated.
- Installed blinds on all of the windows.
- Resolved plumbing problems with low flow to certain faucets.
- Additional electrical outlets added.
- A vintage door has been located and refurbished for the bathroom.
- Hot water heater installed.
- CO<sub>2</sub> detectors added.
- Washer and dryer acquired and installed.
- Structural repairs made under the house to resolve a sagging floor issue.

Next steps include insulating the attic, installing vinyl plank flooring, installing an ADA required access ramp and having internet and communication systems set up.

A big thanks to Fred and Jean Ann Heindl, Tom and Liz Liberatore and John Huffman for their work on the property. To date, they have saved the parish approximately \$10,000 in out-of-pocket expense.




